The layout has considered:

- sunlight into homes and shadowing
- how close buildings are to shops and other services
- how many homes are needed
- distance between buildings
- the size of streets
- views from the street and buildings

Low-rise buildings

Artist's impression of the community centre



Low-rise buildings are located:
between medium buildings
in quieter areas
next to heritage buildings.
Low-rise buildings in the plan:
community centre in small park
existing heritage buildings.

Medium-rise buildings





Medium-rise buildings are located:

• along main streets, such as George Street and Wellington Street.

Medium-rise buildings :

- are mostly 8 to 9 storeys high
- are positioned along the edge of the block
- have courtyards in the middle of the block to provide an outdoor area close to homes.

Tall buildings

The tall buildings are positioned to minimise shadows on to homes, parks and public spaces.





There are 4 tall buildings located on the corner of:

- Kellick Street and Gibson Street.
- Cope Street and McEvoy Street.
- George Street and McEvoy Street.
- McEvoy Street and the new Pitt Street extension.

More sunlight onto buildings by lowering the height of some buildings around the edge of the block .



Position of buildings on the block – orientation







The way buildings are positioned on the block helps to maximise sunlight into homes across the day.

Options reviewed for the location of the tall building

Location of the 4th tall building



To get to the appropriate number of homes an additional tall building is included in the proposed plan.

A number of location options were considered.

To decide on the best location of the 4th tall building we considered:

- shadowing on parks and homes
- the view from buildings
- slope of the block
- position in relation to other buildings, community services and outdoor areas
- distance between tall buildings.



Waterloo south

Location for 4th tower







Positives:

- located near the other tall buildings
- located close to transport and community services

Challenges:

- more homes are overshadowed
- all 4 tall buildings are close together
- overshadows the small park

Location of the fourth tall building







Positives:

- located close to the park to allow:
 - views over the park
 - easy use of the park
- good amounts of sunlight into homes
- located close to transport and community services

Challenges:

- design challenges due to the depth on the block
- more homes are overshadowed
- located near heritage buildings

Location of the fourth tall building







Positives:

- located near the other tall buildings
- more sunlight into homes

Challenges:

- could overshadow existing homes
- all 4 tall buildings are close together

Location of the fourth tall building





Proposed location

Positives:

- located close to Waterloo Park to allow:
 - views over the park
 - easy use of the park
- good amounts of sunlight into homes and outdoor areas.

Challenges:

• important trees are located on the corners of the block.
