

Department of Housing Access, Allocation and Tenure Policy Proposal

On 27 April 2005, the NSW Government announced that the priority client group to be assisted by public housing in the future would be low income people with Complex Housing Need or low income people who do not have access to stable, affordable housing in the private rental market.

This means that people who are homeless, the frail elderly, young people under 20 years without family support, people with a disability or mental illness will be considered a priority.

Other groups eligible for Public Housing will include families with children, aged pensioners, unemployed and low waged adults.

The proposed reforms represent an explicit move away from public housing being for those with low incomes to public housing being for those with low incomes and a Complex Housing Need, Affordability and Accessibility issues.

The *Reshaping Public Housing* reforms end the policy of tenure for life for new tenants and introduce set periods of tenure that may be reviewed on the basis of housing need. Tenants who have already been housed before April 2005 will still keep their life tenure.

The proposed changes to tenure for new tenants include *Long*, *Medium* or *Short term* tenures. *Long-term tenure* (ten years plus) will be offered to households who have long term housing needs

related to their advanced age or permanent disability who have very limited options in the private rental market;

Medium term tenure (five years) will be offered to households who need stable housing at the time of application or allocation but may be able to move into the private rental market in the future (for example, after their children have grown up or their requirement for intensive support has decreased considerably); and

Shorter-term tenure (two years) will be provided to households who may need assistance only for a limited period before they can move into the private market. Examples include young people without family support.

In the case of Waterloo and Redfern the impact of the proposal if introduced will not be as dramatic as in other areas. This is because under the current allocation policies most of the tenancies started in the last few years have been for people in the 'Priority' category which is very similar to the proposed new top category. Waterloo and Redfern have again been the 'laboratory' for testing new ideas. It will be interesting to see the effect on the fabric of the tenant community, especially in a few years time. Hopefully the lessons learnt here will be reacted to quickly to minimize any adverse impact on the tenant community.

Alternatives to high cost credit

High cost credit refers to loans offered by fringe lenders, where as well as a high rate of interest, numerous fees are also charged. Many disadvantaged consumers are drawn into high cost loans by the advertising which promotes the loans as being available to those with a bad credit history and also advertises that the credit can be accessed straight away. These high cost loans are promoted as a way of solving consumers' financial problems, but are more likely to keep consumers in a never ending debt trap. Many people on low incomes or in financial difficulty enter high cost loans because they are not aware of other alternatives which include Centrelink, Credit unions, Charities and the No Interest Loan scheme (NILS).

Centrelink provides benefits in addition to regular entitlements, such as a crisis payment if a person is in severe financial hardship, a pharmaceutical allowance to cover the cost of prescription medicines, rent assistance and telephone allowance. Credit unions offer loans for as little as \$200 with terms starting at three months. They assess consumers' repayment ability and lend to those on welfare benefits.

The Salvation Army is one of the largest providers of material aid in Australia, through more than 260 community services centres nationwide. This may include assistance to families with cash/cheque, food vouchers/ food parcels, clothing, furniture and other household items, accommodation vouchers, housing cost, electricity, gas, rates and other bills, public transport fares. medical and educational expenses and other forms of help as appropriate to the individual. The 'No Interest Loans scheme' offers loans for essential household goods and medical equipment at no interest. A typical NILS loan is for \$600– \$1000 and available for essential household goods such as a washing machine, fridge or medical appliances such as a wheelchair. As loans are repaid over 12-15 months, the money is lent out again to other people in the community. NILS are run by local community groups such as

Revenge on the Telemarketer

Three Little Words That Work!!

These three little words will help eliminate telephone soliciting.

(2) Do you ever get those annoying phone calls with no one on the other end? This is a telemarketing technique where a machine makes phone calls and records the time of day when a person answers the phone.

This technique is used to determine the best time of day for a "real" sales person to call back and get someone at home.

What you can do after answering, if you notice there is no one there, is to immediately start hitting your # button on the phone, 6 or 7 times, as quickly as possible. This confuses the machine that dialed the call and it kicks your number out of their system. Gosh, what a shame

not to have your name in their system any longer!!!

3: When you get those "pre-approved" letters in the mail for everything from credit cards to 2nd mortgages and similar type junk, do not throw away the return envelope.

Peoples Precinct

There are no new details on the DoH's Humans Services Accord as yet. When they become available we will tell you.

Unfortunately there has been a massive increase in the amount of broken beer bottle glass in the area. Please watch out when walking, especially if you have children with you. The termites are on relief food packages now as the fences have all but disappeared. We have been told that another 'new' plan for the replacement of the fences is under development. The old one apparently has died without seeing the light of day. The DoH has again been asked to have the rubbish bins cleaned. The council has said that the Waterloo festival will be held in Danks street again next year and then may move back to Waterloo proper. When the DoH releases the report of the outcomes from the Tenant Conference last year copies will be made available at the Precinct meeting.

The DoH has given some undertakings to provide services in a more tenant friendly manner according to preliminary reports, but we have to wait for the official release to see exactly what undertakings have been given. Tenants are still feeding the pigeons and ibis despite the warnings not to do so. These birds are known lice and disease carriers and prevent other birds nesting in the area. Apparently the council and DoH are going to take action against those found feeding them, so listen to the warning, do yourself and the community a favour, and stop feeding them. **Ross Smith Precinct Representative**

Our bus provides many services for people living in the Redfern/Waterloo area to make life just a bit easier ... and a lot more fun.


