National Indigenous Development Centre



The National Indigenous Development Centre has received approval from the Minister of Planning. The vision for the Centre is as a facility to nurture sporting excellence and personal and leadership development among Australia's Indigenous community. The Centre will provide sporting and educational facilities to be used by Indigenous groups from across the country. Many of the facilities will be available to the local community on a user pays basis.

It will be sited on the old Redfern Public School. The Indigenous Land Corporation (ILC) is now finalising the tender documents to be used to select a list of builders. The call for tenders will go out shortly. It is expected that the selection process will take a number of months and it is likely that a builder will be signed up in the first quarter of 2008. Construction is likely to commence in the second quarter of 2008, with an approximate construction program of 18 months.

Promises of 'Community Engagement'

ILC states that it will continue to ensure that the local community is kept informed over

coming months. Updates will be emailed and posted out on a regular basis, and the on-site signage will be kept up to date with latest news. Shortly before construction starts ILC will hold an open house information event on site. This will be attended by the project team, including representatives from the ILC and the builder, and will be an opportunity for the local community to learn about how the Centre will look, how it will be used and managed, the range of facilities available for community use, and how the construction is to be conducted. It will also provide an opportunity for questions and feedback from the community. This event will be open to everyone with an interest in the project. Further details will be provided closer to the event. 

The changing face of Redfern and Waterloo

With the call for tenders to redevelop Rachel Foster Hospital, residents are seeing the loss of yet another public facility, this time to the private housing market. Dependent on the success of this project is the revitalisation of the Court House as a Community Health Centre. Thus we see the loss of three facilities - hospital, court, and police station - to facilitate the movement of the health centre from the Rachel Foster site, thus making way for the commercial redevelopment of the hospital site. Without the development of one we can't have the creation of the other.

The following facilities have now been lost to area residents - the Public School, Rachel Foster Hospital, the Missionhome aged care facility, the courthouse, and the Old Police Station with its overnight holding cells. They are to be reinvented as an Indigenous sporting complex, private apartments and the relocated Health Centre. All these properties now stand empty waiting for eventual redevelopment. There is nothing new here for local residents, however with the loss of Rachel Fosters Hydrotherapy unit leaving older residents to find places out of the area. The practice of public redevelopment by private investment is now to be extended to the Redfern Railway Station upgrade. Unlike other railway stations which have been redeveloped by Railcorp and the Transit Authority, Redfern Station must be paid for by other developments in the area. The selling of one piece of land to pay for the development of another is the plan of the Redfern Waterloo Authority (RWA) for the area. These plans are expressed in the Built Environment Plan which calls for the privatisation of urban revitalisation.

As with the redevelopment scheme that has been established by the Department of Housing to develop the Elizabeth St block opposite Redfern Park, so will more redevelopment involve these type of arrangements? We can expect to see old style walkups make way for more of these redevelopments in the near future as the RWA makes its final recommendations for changing the face of Redfern and Waterloo. No other suburb has its own Minister or a development authority to oversee its redevelopment and one must wonder why Redfern/Waterloo has to be the guinea pig for such an experiment. Residents must wonder what gains they will get from all this as we are made to pay again and again for what should be government supported services.

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DOH POTTERY TEAM GOES FUNCTIONAL

John Perry Team leader at Redfern has advised the RWN of some important changes.

The Department's Clients Service Team managing the Surry Hills and Redfern properties has undergone a change in managing workloads. Client Service staff are currently placed in a Property Portfolio managing the day to day tenancy issues relating to approximately 400 dwellings. This meant that all work involving the property was directed to one officer placing heavy demands on their time and ability to manage a multitude of tasks. The changes we have made are designed to improve efficiency and performance and allow specific tasks to be managed by specific officers. Each officer will remain in charge of their list of properties. They will still take clients enquiries based on the property the

client resides in. This means the contact phone numbers remain the same however, following discussion with the client the officer will be able to make a referral to another officer who is responsible for processing a specific function. The functions include Transfers, Arrears Recovery Management, Nuisance & Annoyance cases, Client Feedback, Ministerial and Local Member of Parliament Enquiries, Allocation Processes and Lawn Care & Cleaning Contracts.

These changes should provide a more consistent approach to managing the work loads and allow the team to reduce delays in processing and improve response times to our clients

Volunteer Formal Recognition is Coming

RedWater news has been informed of plans that the Department of Housing is to form a Volunteer policy giving official recognition of Volunteers within social housing. Minister of Housing stated in a letter "that the Department values the significant contribution made by volunteers in our society by contributing to the development of vibrant and healthy communities." This is a significant change in the previous entrenched attitude and denial of volunteer usage by Department of Housing in service delivery. It is believed historically that there was a fear that with formal recognition came the obligations of Volunteer Training, insurance, reimbursement of expenses incurred, occupational Health and Safety compliance - all a small price to pay for the overall benefit, both financial and in terms of Service Delivery achieved by the DoH. RedWaternews welcomes the Ministers support and recognition of volunteers and we look forward to being consulted on this positive new policy. Waterloo Green Action Plan has arrived !

RWN reported in our last edition that Waterloo residents and frontline workers with the assistance of HCAP formed an action group. The group was set up in response to significant concerns about safety issues in the popular Waterloo Green space which provides highly valuable recreational and open space to the local residents of the Waterloo public housing estate. The RWA in response, worked with, the Department of Housing and other government agencies to develop an Action Plan to make Waterloo Green a safer and more user-friendly place. The plan also adopted the recommendations of a community safety audit that was undertaken by the action group with assistance of Redfern Police.

Key actions in the plan include:

- Improving public safety and amenity on and around Waterloo Green.
- Reducing anti-social behaviour associated with excessive public drinking.
- Providing more information about services, events and local interest groups.
- Improving access to key human services.
- Making more use of meeting and activities spaces.
- Improving interaction between older residents and young people.

The Action group welcomes the plan as a significant step forward and will be monitoring it's progress closely to ensure we see some long awaited tangible results. 

May we take this opportunity to wish you all a blessed Christmas and a happy New Year.





Requesting Maintenance

When something in your unit or house needs repairing call the maintenance call centre 13 15 71 which is available 24 hours 7 days a week. All tenants should have a copy of the DOH guide for Maintenance work, which will help you describe what the problem is to the operator. You may also wish to have your Customer number on hand which can be found on your Rent payment card. Make sure you describe the problem in detail and how it is affecting you or your family. This will help the operator to decide what category your job falls under. Remember and ask for a copy of the Job Reference number in case you need to ring back later and what time frame you can expect the job to be completed. If you have problems getting the job completed consider contacting the departments feedback team who deal with complaints and compliments on 1800 652 059. If you have followed all these steps but still have a job outstanding issue ask to speak to your local team leader or contact your precinct Representative (details available from local housing office or HCAP) for advice or contact advice agencies such as the Redfern Legal Centre. What are precinct representatives?

Any public housing tenant living within a precinct may be elected as a precinct representative. Precinct representatives call and chair meetings within their precinct to obtain tenant views on issues and provide information. The one of the most important aspect of the precinct representative's role involves listening to tenant's ideas, concerns and issues. Precinct representatives report these ideas, concerns and issues to the NAB or Housing Standards meetings and report back to the precinct on developments, action or initiatives. They are valued volunteers who support the development of the community. So get behind them and support them for more information contact your housing Team leader or HCAP on 9698 9569
